# Growers dismayed by aid amount

SEATTLE — Washington apple growers say they doubt they'll get much relief from the state's \$92 million share of an \$8.7 billion emergency farm assistance bill.

Even if the entire sum went to apple growers, it would be less than half of the \$200 million loss on fruit grown in 1998, said Randy Smith, president of the Washington Growing Clearinghouse, which represents 2,800 orchardists in northcentral Washington.

The allocation "isn't as much as we had hoped for and probably not enough to have a significant impact on the loss that occurred," he said.

"I haven't seen the fine print," added Smith. "We'll have to see how it plays out."

Sen. Slade Gorton, R-Wash., tried to reserve \$50 million for fruit and vegetable growers nationwide, but that language was dropped.

President Clinton signed the measure into law on Friday. Most of the money, about \$6 billion, will compensate farmers for depressed crop prices.

Washington's \$92 million share "doesn't seem like enough, not for the whole state," said Ralph Longanecker, a retired third-generation grower in Tonasket.

Apple growers were dealt a multiple whammy last year - the lowest apple prices in a decade, the largest crops in history, growing competition from other countries and a heat wave that cut shelf life so the fruit had to be sold quickly at fire-sale prices.
